Forward. In a year that continued to be complicated by COVID-19, we set our focus on moving **forward** for the families we serve. We are proud of the work accomplished in this most extraordinary year; work not only of our incredible expert staff, leadership and Board of Directors, but also, the work of our clients and their support systems. We are pleased to share this "2021-2022 Report to Our Community", rich with stories of movement and action focused on helping the over 3,700 children and youth of Lambton County to reach their potential!

Moving **forward** with children and families this year meant continued shifts and adjusted service delivery approaches in response to fluctuating pandemic restrictions. Our dedicated staff, driven by passion and commitment found creative ways to work through PPE and virtual therapy platforms to help children reach their goals. With infection prevention and control practices including enhanced cleaning, daily health screening, isolation requirements and vaccinations, we were so pleased to move **forward** across the year to return to more in-person services.

In the summer of 2021, we celebrated the Government of Ontario announcement of an investment in the child rehabilitation sector. It has been many years since any increase in funding, placing considerable pressure on services with large caseloads and growing waitlists. Pathways received \$1.1M from the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services to help support service delivery. The funding will also be used to move **forward** our work as a SmartStart Hub. Planning has been underway to prepare for the launch later in 2022, that will see SmartStart Hubs across the province deliver a consistent and streamlined service experience for families, with a clear entry point to special needs services that support children and families to get the help they need sooner.

Moving **forward** in 2021/2022 also had our community splashing in the pool again, after completion of the \$1.6M complete refurbishment project. We have heard from many that this therapeutic pool is a treasured resource for Sarnia-Lambton, and as pandemic restrictions lifted, folks of all ages were pleased to take advantage of the warm water and accessible environment.

Our work on Equity, Diversity and Inclusion continued with training for the full staff and the Board of Directors. Truth and Reconciliation work had our team participate in a Kairos Blanket Exercise where we learned of the historical and ongoing impact of colonialization. Trauma Informed Care and the San'yas Indigenous Cultural Safety Online Training was also prioritized for staff learning. Reflection and acknowledgement of the harms and mistakes of the past, and of our present, is a starting place for considering how we can each, in our own way, and as an organization, move **forward** in a spirit of reconciliation and healing.

We had the opportunity this year to set in stone, a legacy sign celebrating the founding and continued support to Pathways from the Rotary Club of Sarnia. Thank you to Rotarians, and the many generous donors who continue to believe in us, supporting programs and initiatives to help our children and families.

The shared commitment to our Mission, Vision and Values by our Directors, staff, and volunteers, grounds our energies to ensure support for children and youth to help them achieve their potential for a better quality of life. As we look **forward** in 2022/23 fiscal year, we set our focus on activities to help us achieve our strategic goals. We do so with a sense of hope that the challenges of the last 2½ years of the pandemic are fading, and with a sense of pride and strength, and a renewed awareness that together, we can move **forward** for those we serve!


Set in Stone

Pathways would not be where it is today without partnership, specifically without the continued support and relationship between the organization and The Rotary Club of Sarnia. To memorialize and acknowledge this ongoing commitment to the children and youth in Sarnia-Lambton, Pathways, in partnership with The Rotary, installed a legacy sign at the Murphy Road entrance.

Over 50 years ago, a group of people from Sarnia volunteered to drive families to London so children with disabilities could receive therapy services. Hoping to bring that support to Sarnia, The Rotary set out to open a local Children's Treatment Centre. Pathways Health Centre for Children opened in 1975 on land leased from The Rotary Club of Sarnia, an arrangement that still holds strong today.

Continued investments over time by The Rotary Club of Sarnia have supported several expansions as well as the lead donor of the recent therapeutic pool refurbishment.



Pathways Pool Re-opens

After a \$1.6M refurbishment and closures due to pandemic restrictions, Pathways was excited to move forward and reopen our therapeutic pool in the summer of 2021.

The complete renovation involved extensive improvements to the thirty-year-old pool infrastructure. This included mechanical and electrical upgrades, as well as allowing for fully automated water filtration, sterilization and chemical systems. The pool continues to be fully accessible with a ramp, water wheel chairs, a ceiling lift transfer system, and accessible change rooms.

The therapeutic pool is an integral service to the Sarnia-Lambton community and a service Pathways is proud to offer. From Parent and Tot classes, swim lessons, pediatric rehabilitation, sensory swims, and community groups for fitness and rehabilitation; our therapeutic pool has something to offer everyone!

Mabel ~ a family story



At two-years-old, Mabel has been with Pathways for most of her young life. After being introduced to the Centre as a baby for an infant hearing screening during the pandemic, Mabel is now working to develop her skills through four services: Physiotherapy Occupational Therapy, Speech-Language Pathology and Special Needs Resource Support. Although services began virtually, Mabel's mom, Pam, said there were advantages to meeting over Zoom in the beginning: "...less travel time and easier to manage with a newborn. I feel like we were brought in at a good time."

For Pam, one of the best parts of working with Pathways has been the supportive discussion about milestones and the developmental journey. "The staff at Pathways have helped set Mabel her own timeline for milestones, so we can see progression in a way that makes sense for us."

Mabel's growth is seen not just in Centre, but at home too. Around her brother, Mabel is always trying to join activities, in typical younger sibling fashion. From waking up with a smile on her face, to pretending to read the newspaper. Pam says Mabel is "all-around, a happy kid".

Looking at next steps, Mabel's short-term goals are focused on mobility, hoping that new skills will help her to keep up with her brother. Long-term, Mabel's parents seek to support her to participate fully in life and the community.

I went into the rehearsal and there were four volunteers to help me with singing and dancing. I'm glad you helped me make friends and sing and dance last year.

I'm glad for my speech therapist to play with me and learn how to talk, sing and play when I was three years old. I went to daycare and people were kind at daycare and took care of me. Supporting Children with Autism

The transition to the comprehensive needs-based family centred Ontario Autism Program (OAP) saw new supports launched through Pathways this year. We expanded our team to include a Supervisor of Autism Services and expanded the role of our Family Engagement Coordinator to include Autism Liaison, supporting families navigating autism services.

Purchased Services


In response to family direct funds for core clinical services, Pathways was happy to slowly start offering Speech-Language and Occupational Therapy as part of our purchased services offerings. Purchasing services is not new for Pathways, already offering fee-for-service programs like C.A.C.H.É Childcare, the Lifelong Learning Program and Therapeutic Aquatics. Pathways will continue to put any profit made towards maintaining high-quality services for clients and staff.

Entry to School

An intensive entry to school program was offered for children registered in the OAP entering school for the first time in 2022. This program is a six-month, group-based, skill-building program, focused on helping children develop school-readiness skills. After completing the group-based part of the program, children participate in the second part of the program, which provides them with individual transition supports as they enter school.

Caregiver Mediated Early Years Program

This year, Pathways began to partner with TVCC (London) to provide the Caregiver Mediated Early Years program to caregivers of young children diagnosed with autism and registered with the OAP. Through these programs, caregivers learn therapeutic strategies and specific techniques based on their child's individual needs. The programs aim to build caregivers' capacity to support their child's skill development. We were thrilled to have two staff trained this past year to deliver JASPER (Joint Attention Symbolic Play Emotional Regulation) and Pivotal Response Training as part of our support to children registered in the OAP.

Diagnostic Hub

This year we celebrated that Pathways was approved to increase the capacity of our Autism Diagnostic Hub services by 50%, supporting a total of 36 assessments. Local Paediatrician, Dr. T. Lacroix was welcomed to the Centre as part of the Hub to support this increase, in addition to the services provided by visiting Paediatrician Dr. E. Roach-Fox.

Moving Forward Strategically...

Beginning in September of 2021, Pathways, with the assistance of Toronto social consultancy, Mendicant Group, worked through a number of steps to arrive at a new Strategic Plan for 2022-2025. The Plan was developed with the input of many, with careful consideration of trends shaping the sector, and challenges and opportunities facing the organization. The outcome of the work was a confirmation of the core purpose of the organization, the populations we serve and the goals we seek to achieve for those we serve by the end of the 2024-25 fiscal year.

Be more inclusive and accessible



100 Women Who Care

The LLP social enterprise provides young adults with special needs opportunities to grow independence and self-confidence. Pathways was overjoyed to welcome the community back into the Secret Santa Shoppe in 2021. After running a drive-through version of the event in 2020, we reimagined the in-person Shoppe experience and turned our large Lambton Room into a winter wonderland for 10 wonderful days.

This tradition has been a favourite in our community for over 15 years now and offers an opportunity for children to shop for their loved ones independently, with the help of an elf, of course! At times our elves are challenged with redirecting children to gifts felt to be a better fit for those on the list but ultimately, we leave it up to the young shoppers as they are often adamant that Dad really wants nail polish and Mom needs, yet again, another ice scraper!

Eighty six volunteer elves kept the Shoppe running, collectively donating 681 hours of their time; over 750 children made purchases for their loved ones! Thanks to the gracious response, Pathways was able to raise \$42,000.

From story books to hockey tickets, we hope all 3,718 presents sold made someone smile during the holidays!






